KEVIN'S KORNER

Thanksgiving aims to bring us together. When we assemble at the table with family and friends, we're signifying the need for unity. The things that hinder our oneness—geography, distance, busyness, relationship issues, political opinions, and so on—get set aside, or at least temporarily overcome, so that we can be with one another in a spirit of gratitude. This is probably part of what President Abraham Lincoln had in mind on October 3, 1863, when he issued a proclamation, written by Secretary of State William Seward, declaring that the last Thursday in November would be a day of national Thanksqiving. Note that this was during the depths of the Civil War, when thousands were dying on battlefields and the country was being ripped apart. In the midst of all the violence, division, and suffering, Lincoln announced:

The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God.

After acknowledging the domestic turmoil and sorrow of war, but always with an eye toward God's acts of blessing and deliverance, Lincoln recommended that everyone "fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and union."

So this year, when you sit down to enjoy your Thanksgiving feast, remember the words of a President who occupied the Oval Office more than 160 years ago, a President who aimed to counter despair with hope, and who tried to create some national cohesion by promoting national gratitude. What had been a farming and harvest celebration, with roots in the Puritan Pilgrims, observed primarily in northern states, officially became a nationwide occasion for giving thanks.

Between now and Thanksgiving, our nation will elect its next President. Though we're not in the midst of full-blown civil war, our country's cultural and political landscape is certainly filled with division, conflict, and strife. Political vitriol has intensified. Candidates, as well as our fellow citizens, are quick to take extreme positions and demonize their opponents. We've even witnessed assassination attempts. As we go to the polls, tensions are high and anxiety about the future grows.

Yet there is reason for gratitude, because we're blessed to have this opportunity to participate in the governing of our nation by voicing our opinions and casting our votes. As followers of Jesus, God's people in Christ, we've been given the ministry of reconciliation. We're also called to intercede on behalf of our nation through prayer. To that end, I want to share with you the following prayer, written by pastor Kimberly Deckel. It captures both our rights and our responsibilities as citizens of our country and most of all citizens of God's coming kingdom. I hope it will be useful to you in your own thinking and decision-making as you approach the election:

Almighty God, prepare our hearts and minds as we head toward voting. We express gratitude for the right to vote, and we lament the brokenness of our democracy and voting system—a system that continues to suffer from inequity. Empower us, O Lord, to make decisions rooted in the ways of Jesus rather than the ways of the world. Give us wisdom and discernment as we cast our votes with a humble spirit, and let our voting be an act of prayer. May we be reminded that the candidates we vote for are not our savior, but you are the bringer of the heavenly kingdom, and our ultimate hope rests in you. We commend this nation to your care, in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.*





GRACE'S RECIPE BOX

There is a correction to be made in the September/October newsletter for a recipe titled "Uncle Mike's Banana Coconut Bread." The recipe calls for 1 tsp. baking soda and 1 ½ tsp. Kosher salt. (I accidently put baking soda twice) I apologize for the error.

Sweet Potato Biscuits

34 cup cooked mashed sweet potatoes14 cup melted butter2/3 cup milk

Mix these together and add:

1 T. sugar, ½ tsp. salt, 4 tsp. baking powder 1¾ cup all-purpose flour

Kneed ½ minute. Roll out to ½ -inch thickness and cut in rounds. Place on greased cookie sheet at 450° for 10 – 12 minutes.

Banana Cake

2 cups sifted cake flour, 1 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup shortening, 1 1/2 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 tsp. lemon extract, 2 eggs, beaten; 1 cup mashed bananas 1/2 cup buttermilk

Mix and sift flour, baking soda, and salt. Set aside. In another bowl, cream shortening until soft and smooth; gradually add sugar, creaming until very fluffy. Beat in flavoring and slightly beaten eggs; add bananas. Add flour mixture alternating with buttermilk, beating until smooth after each addition. Turn into greased layer pans or sheet pan and bake in 350° oven for about 30 minutes. Cool. Cover with Sea Foam Frosting.

Sea Foam Frosting:

1 egg white, beaten 1 cup brown sugar, packed 1/4 cup water, 1 T. corn syrup, 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Beat egg white until stiff with mixer. Cook brown sugar, water and corn syrup until it forms a thin thread when dropped from the side of the spoon. With the mixer at high speed, pour the cooked syrup slowly into the beaten egg white. Add vanilla. Continue beating until the icing is the right consistency to spread on the banana cake.
